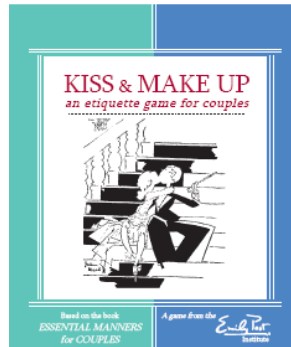




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Kiss & Make Up: An Etiquette Game for Couples **From The Emily Post Institute**

BURLINGTON, VT— If you were hopelessly lost, would your significant other stop for directions? Is it okay to sneak a peek at the handsome man across the restaurant? How did Cassanova become so famous as a lover? Does your S.O. think you're willing to compromise? Would she say so in front of friends, over drinks?

All these questions and many more are posed in *Kiss & Make Up: An Etiquette Game for Couples*, from the Emily Post Institute. Based on Peter Post's new book, *Essential Manners for Couples: From Snoring and Sex to Finances and Fighting Fair—What Works, What Doesn't, and Why*, (Collins; Nov., 2005; \$21.95), *Kiss & Make Up* presents couples with a chance to laugh, debate, disagree and perhaps even learn a thing or two about each other.

With questions drawn from Peter's new book, *Kiss & Make Up* takes couples through three rounds of questions: *Relationship* questions cover the basics of couples manners and are worth one point per person. *Kiss & Make Up* questions offer each S.O. the chance to guess what the other would do in a situation with stakes equal to the task—if you mess up, you lose points. If a couple gets really behind they can try a *Catching up with the Joneses* question for a whopping 6-point chance at redemption. Beyond competing with your friends, the goal of the game is to start conversations about the fundamentals of coupledness and the manners integral to making relationships work.
